May Term Offers Alternatives

"The idea [of May Term] is to be innovative, to get out into the St. Louis community which is so rich in culture and in science."

And the benefits of May term are many. Classroom groups can get off campus to utilize St. Louis community resources. The courses are non-traditional, and students can enjoy the in-depth study of one subject in small classes which augment student-teacher interaction. Students employed full-time can attend courses in the May Term and both summer terms to help in reaching the normal student load of thirty-two credit hours per year.

Presenting usual fare for May term resulted in a decline of enrollment since it began with some 100 students in 1975. Recent statistics reveal that 72 students enrolled in 1983 and 1984; 65 enrolled in 1985. Of those who registered in 1983, 93% were Missouri Baptist College students; in 1984, 87%; in 1986, 94%. The average number of students per class in 1983, '84, and '85 was 8, 5, and 4, respectively.

Spring Wild Flowers of Missouri, first offered in 1985 and taught by Mr. Puhse, is one of sixteen courses to be offered this year. The first-ever Drama Workshop (a combination of beginning acting, oral interpretation, and technical work) will be team-taught by Kerry Brooks, Dr. McCoy, Dr. Walker. American Environmental History, a new course which examines America's changing attitudes about the environment, will be taught by Dr. Herman; and the Bible and science will come together again in Dr. Madden's Science and Religion course.

Because May term offers a difference when it comes to course content, "We see [it] as really being a service to our own MBC students," says Dr. Dykstra. May term seeks to inspire students with the fun of learning through presenting material appropriate to a summer-time atmosphere.

THE SOFTBALL SPARTANS trudged home after five losses at the William Woods Tournament in Fulton, Missouri, March 21-22. William Woods was first to halt the team Friday, 9-0. The softball team later tumbled to Central Iowa, 6-0. Unable to nail any hits off of the Quincy College pitchers, the team was again defeated, 7-0. In the fourth game against Culver-Stockton, they lost 2-0. During the fifth and final game against Columbia, the team was able to get a couple of hits and score a run, but succumbed this time to the Columbia College Bulldogs.

After reviewing statistics, softball coach Diane Albers-Carney said, "We need to hit, cut down on the walks, and cut down on the errors. If we do that, we can win."

THE BASEBALL SPARTANS have steamed their way to a 10 and 5 record, partially because of their performance at the recent Missouri Southern Tourney, March 21-23. MBC slammed Tarkio (5-2), Harris Stowe (8-5), and Missouri Southern (8-0). The only loss was to the School of the Ozarks (5-6) in an extra inning game.
