CHANGES IN THE MBC LIBRARY Kris French

If you have been in the library recently, you may have noticed some changes. The library has been rearranged to make room for new books arriving this semester, most of which will be in the religion section. Midwestern Seminary is contributing approximately 5,000 books and the library of the late Dink Marler has been donated to MBC.

The summer heat did not slacken the efforts of Steven Gateley, Irene Baker, and Karen Snead as they hurried to complete the remodeling in time for school. This summer a counter was added to the receptionist's area, book shelving was added in offices, and a whole new section of shelving for the general book collection in the reading room (donated by Southwestern Bell) was assembled. In ten days, all of the library's 40,000 volumes (except reference books) were moved and shelves were re-aligned for better visibility.

Also, the library has adopted a new "Open Door Policy". The doors between the library and the reading room will now be left

open. Because of this policy, Mr. Gateley asks that students please enter the library quietly.

As in the past, the MBC library is involved in the Info-Pass program. Through this system, students can borrow books from other libraries which are also in the Info-Pass program. There are eighty-one different libraries in the St. Louis area involved in this program, including Maryville College, Monsanto Company, Logan College of Chiropractic, and St. John's Mercy Medical Center. (For a complete listing, check in the library.) If MBC's library does not have the book you need, see the librarian at the circulation desk for information on how to use the Info-Pass program.

If you should need a cassette recorder or a recrd player, the library has several for student use. These are for personal uses, as well as academic. There are headphones available for privacy. Check at the circulation desk to sign-out this equipment. Several electric typewriters are also available.

YOUNG SCHOLARS AWARDS

The National Endowment for the Humanities invites applications for Younger Scholars awards, a program for individuals to conduct research and writing projects in the humanities during the summer of 1986. Award recipients will be expected to work full time for nine weeks during the summer, researching and writing a paper under the close supervision of a humanities scholar. No academic credit may be sought for these projects.

Awards are \$2,200 for college students and \$1,800 for high school students. Each award includes \$400 for the project adviser.

Applicants must be 21 years of age or under throughout the calendar year in which the application is submitted; or, if they are over 21, they must be full-time college students pursuing an undergraduate degree at the time of application. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or foreign nationals who have lived in the U.S. for at least three consecutive years at the time of application. Individuals who will have received or expect to receive a bachelor's degree by October 1, 1986, are not eligible to apply.

By definition, the term humanities includes, but is not

limited to, the study of history; philosophy; languages; linguistics; literature; archaeology; jurisprudence; the history, theory, and criticism of the arts; ethics; comparative religion; and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches.

In both subject matter and methodology, projects must be firmly grounded in one or more of the disciplines of the humanities. Also, projects must fall within one of the following three areas: 1. The interpretation of cultural works. The applicant may interpret works of literature, philosophy, the visual arts, the performing arts, or other cultural forms. Although NEH does not offer support for the creation of original works of art or for training in the arts, it does support projects that develop historical or theoretical approaches to the arts. 2. The study of historical ideas, figures, and events. Projects with this emphasis encourage the exploration of major events, figures, groups, systems of thought and historical or intellectual movements. 3. Understanding the disciplines of the humanities. In a project with this goal, an applicant might explore the nature of the humanities by

THE REAL McCOY

There is a new face on campus, and it's a very distinguished one at that. Dr. Donald McCoy is the new chairman of the Social Science and Behavioral Science departments. He is also both an English and Business professor.

Dr. McCoy has led an interesting life. He has had two very different careers: one in teaching, one in business. He has been a professor at several universities across the country, most recently at UMSL where he was an adjunct professor. Later on he left teaching, became a certified management consultant, and went into educational consulting for industry. He and a partner formed a consulting firm which worked with both domestic and foreign companies. This often took him to Canada, England, and Holland on business. This last year they sold their consulting firm, and Dr. McCoy decided to return to teaching, a profession he had missed sorely. Now he is here at MBC.

Dr. McCoy has published three textbooks, Rhetoric and Reading, Keys to Good Instruction, and a book on the poetry of Robert Frost. In addition to publishing these books, he has also written and produced 175 video training programs for various corporations. Continued on page 6

According to David, "St. Louis is a most impressive town." He has been to the Arch, to the Mississippi River, and to Union

SOPHOMORE CLASS CHAPEL

Those who attended the Sophomore Class chapel Tuesday morning, October 1, were privileged to hear Coach Lee McKinney speak on how God has molded him to be a happy, successful, and compassionate man -- a fact, not a boast. Although Coach McKinney may feel he follows his dog in order of importance at home, he is certainly a leader on this campus.

Coach McKinney, who has been at MBC for eight years, recounted for the chapel audience his strengthening relationship with Jesus Christ. At the age of 15, two years after joining his church, young Lee decided that he had not accepted Christ as his Savior but had been baptized because his friends had been also. As a teenager, he began growing spiritually and admitted to God, "I can't cut it and I can't handle it. You're going to have to just take over."

Coach McKinney said that God has given him more friends than one man could ask for in a lifetime. Almost certainly the coach has been blessed with these friends because he befriended them first.

The cause of Coach McKinney's spiritual maturity and warm, casual personality is grounded in the security of

knowing God as his fortress. During his talk, the coach quoted from Psalm 18:2 -- "The Lord is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer. In Him I will trust."

Coach McKinney, an example to the student body of MBC, closed his talk by saying, "With the good Lord as my rock and strength, I'll keep on following Him and doing the best I can to let others know how I feel."
