Once again it is time for the Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture Series - February 20-21 at 10:30 a.m. in DeLozier Chapel. Two convocations will be held: one on Thursday at which attendance is required, and another on Friday at which it is optional.

The featured speaker of the Staley Lectures is to be Dr. Eric Rust, Professor Emeritus of Christian Philosophy from The Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Rust is well known throughout theological circles, and has written several books. The main theme of the Staley Lectures will be "Education and Christianity." Everyone is urged to come and listen.
