MBC REPRESENTATIVES ATTEND REGIONAL EDUCATION CONFERENCE

On September 30, Dr. Patrick O. Copley, President; Dr. Arlen Dykstra, Academic Dean; and Dr. Judy Leach, Assistant Professor of Psychology attended the St. Louis Regional Education Conference held at Mehlville Senior High School.

The conference at Mehlville, sponsored by the Missouri Department of Education, was only one session of many meeting concurrently around the state on this same day. All were meeting to discuss the 1985 Excellence in Education Act. The Mehlville meeting was attended by over 1,000 administrators and academically strong high school students from the St. Louis area.

Missouri State Education Commissioner Arthur Mallory spoke on the "Major Provisions of the Excellence in Education Act," outlining a program that is comprised of a testing program whereby competency in seven subjects can be measured on a district basis. Other features of the act include requiring each school district to have a discipline policy and to endow their

students with one-year non-renewable scholarships of \$2,000. These scholarships would be available to students who have an 85% or better average and who plan on going into education. The hope is that this will draw better minds into teaching.

"There is a relationship between dollars in education and the quality in education," said Commissioner Mallory.

Campus Student Ministries, MBC's organization specifically concerned with the students' spiritual growth, is not just for CSM members.

According to Paul Wellinghoff, the organization's president, the function of CSM is to provide for all students an on-campus ministry directed at the spiritual aspects of the students' lives. CSM accomplishes this by involving students in such activities as the recent student-led revival held during Christian Focus Week. One upcoming CSM activity is a retreat Oct. 18-19, the theme of which is "Breaking Barriers".
