KIRKPATRICK SHARES EXPERIENCES FROM U.N.

Several faculty members, staff, and students attended a lecture at Washington University last Tuesday afternoon. The guest lecturer and speaker was the former U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, Dr. Jeane Kirkpatrick.

Because of her first-hand experience working at the U.N. in New York City for five years, Dr. Kirkpatrick's topic "The United Nations" was well chosen. She gave information on what the functions of the U.N. actually are as well as what goes on when it meets in September every year for General Assembly.

At the conclusion of her talk, Dr. Kirkpatrick took time to answer questions from the audience. The convincing answers she gave to such questions as "Why do you favor American aid to Nicaragua?" showed that she bases her judgments on realistic politics not idealism. Dr. Kirkpatrick answered by saying "There are people and resources from Cuba and the Soviet Union in Nicaragua today ... The conflict there is now

internationalized ... It is unrealistic to call it a domestic skirmish."

Gaining information on such an important organization as the U.N. from a lady who has had "hands-on" experience in dealing with that organization is truly exciting. The lecture by Dr. Kirkpatrick was enjoyed by everyone attending from MBC.

Women's Cross Country Team Brings Home First Trophy

The MBC Women's Cross Country Team, coached by Clark Wille, captured its first trophy by taking third place at the SIU Invitational. The team was led by Tammi Dill who placed fifth with a time of 19:14. Tammy is from Belleville. Miriam Otten (New Haven, Mo.) place 17th with a time of 20:02. Beth Doerr (20:12) and Kathy Burgdorf (20:17), both from St. Louis, placed 19th and 20th, respectively. Tiny Evans from DeSoto, placed 22nd with a time of 20:23 and Kathy Frailing from Colorado Springs placed 35th with a time of 21:51. The team will be running in the Missouri Invitational at Columbia this Saturday.

The Spartans, coached by Al Trost, opened their soccer season last Saturday against the Tarkio Owls. The Spartans trailed most of the game, but came up with a goal to tie, 1-1, in the first half. The Owls scored in the last minute of the game, making the final score 1-2. On Monday, the Spartans took on Webster College in an exciting game, with the Spartans winning (4-0). The Spartans took on the Maryville Saints on Tuesday afternoon. The Spartans

played very aggressively and managed a 2-2 tie. Ed Mesplay, Spartan team member, feels confident that the kinks have been worked out in the opening games and a successful season will follow.

The Lady Spartans, coached by Jim Draude, played the Principia Indians Saturday. The Spartans dominated most of the soccer game and came through to beat the Indians (1-0), with an exciting goal by Geri Voss. Dana Jaimerson, who plays halfback for the Spartans, felt this game was the turning point for the team and that the Spartans will have a productive season. Tuesday afternoon the Lady Spartans continued their winning streak, this time subduing the Rolla Miners (3-0). The Lady Spartans leave this weekend for a conference game against Tarkio College. Hopefully, this will be another game they can add to their winning streak.

After losing to Southeast Missouri State University (8-15 and 5-15) and to Arkansas State (1-15 and 9-15) on September 11, the MBC Volleyball Team returned to their home court on September 17 where they defeated Fontbonne College in the best of five.

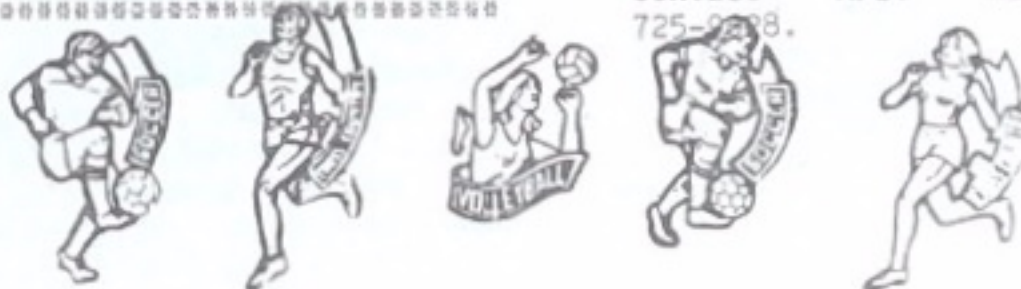
