CHAPEL CHIMES

The first C is conversion, which means to open the door and look at the other person for what he is and what he believes. The second C is cooperation, which we can achieve by looking at the insights of what the other person has been doing and maybe even learning from them. ## MOVIE REVIEW

### SILVER BULLET

Silver Bullet is the latest movie based on a book by the master of suspense, Stephen King. Although the movie is somewhat predictable and the acting is not so great, the suspense will kill you. It will have you scrunching down in your seat, too scared to move.

The story revolves around a werewolf that terrorizes a small town, killing some of its residents. A small wheel-chair bound boy is the only one who believes that the murders have been caused by a werewolf. He tries to convince his sister of this, and then his uncle. The uncle, played by Gary Bussey, is one of the brightest characters in this film. It is unfortunate for Bussey, though, as he again is cast as a beer-drinking, crazy-man. ## NATIONAL COMPETITION

The National Endowment for the Humanities is commemorating the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution in 1987, by launching a special nationwide competition for college students.

The award recipients will be expected to work full time for nine weeks during the summer, researching and writing a paper on the U.S. Constitution under the close supervision of a teacher or professor of the humanities. No academic credit may be sought for these projects.

Applicants must be twenty-one years of age or under; or if they are over twenty-one, they must be full-time college students pursuing an undergraduate degree. All applicants must be U.S. citizens or foreign nationals who have lived in the United States for at least three consecutive years. Individuals who will have received or expect to receive a bachelor's degree by October 1, 1986 are not eligible.

To request guidelines and application forms for the special competition, write to: National Competition, Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, Room 504, National Endowment for the Humanities, 1100 Pennsylvania Avenue N.W., Washington, D.C. 20506. Awards are \$2,200 for college students. Each award includes \$400 for the teacher or professor who serves as project adviser.

## WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL TEAM TAKES FIRST AT CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS

This past weekend the women's volleyball team defeated six teams to take first place at the conference championships. In pool play, they defeated Park (15-6, 15-17, 15-9); Baptist Bible (15-2, 15-2); School of the Ozarks (15-13, 15-12); Central Bible College (15-2, 15-3); Columbia (15-2, 15-6); and Westminster (15-9, 15-10). In the semifinals, the Lady Spartans defeated Westminster (15-12, 15-6); and in the finals they cruised past Park 15-11, 15-1. According to Coach Wasser, the toughest competitors the team was up against were from Park, Westminster and School of the Ozarks.

Chosen for the All-Conference First Team were Nancy Albers, Linda Ebert and Geri Weik. Linda Ebert was also chosen for the Academic All-Conference Team.

This weekend the team will be playing in the District Championships in St. Joseph, Missouri. The Lady Spartans are ranked second in the District behind Missouri Western, the host of this tournament. The team will play Rockhurst, Culver-Stockton, and Drury in pool play before advancing on to play Missouri Western, Southwest Baptist and School of the Ozarks in tournament play.

## CROSS-COUNTRY TEAM RUNS WELL

The MBC men's Cross-Country Team, led by Darren Strickler, finished first at the Ozark Collegiate Conference Cross-Country Championships this past weekend. The first five runners across the finish line were: Darren Strickler (24:50), Paul Brigman (25:18), Danny Bryant (25:43), Greg Reecht (25:47) and Tom DeClue (25:52). Since the first five finishers were from MBC, they completely shut-out all of the other teams with a score of only fifteen points.

In the women's race, the team from MBC took second. The team was once again led by Tammy Bill (18:17), who won the race. Tiny Evans was (19:14), ninth; Miriam Otten (19:34), eleventh; Kathy Burgdorf (19:56), thirteenth; and Kathy Trailing (20:39), fourteenth.

This weekend, the team will be traveling to Fulton, Missouri, for the District Championships. This event will be the qualifying meet for nationals, which will be held in Wisconsin on November sixteenth.
